

# Been a victim of mortgage fraud? Help is just a phone call away.



- Have you reported the mortgage fraud or filed a complaint?
- Did you contact a victim service provider?
- Do you have copies of the following documents – loan application, verifications, HUD-1 Settlement Form?
- Do you have the mortgage servicer contact name and information?
- Do you have a physical description of the personnel you worked with (in case of identity theft)?
- Have you spoken with a HUD-approved housing counselor?

Your help is just a phone call or email away. It is important to have detailed information for the victim service provider or attorney, which helps in the reporting and prosecution process.
